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BOARDING HOUSE Development

ur 150th anniversary celebrations have enabled us to celebrate the past whilst also looking to the future and nowhere is this represented more clearly than by the development of our new boarding house, which unites tradition with mid-21st Century accommodation, comfort, and pastoral care.

To see the building grow in front of our eyes has been both a privilege and a unique learning opportunity for our pupils to gain real-world insights into the construction industry. Led by Nicola Sodhi, teachers have worked closely with the project manager from Stepnell, the construction company, to plan activities that enable the pupils to interact with builders, architects, and other project workers. These activities have been hands-on and active and have engaged the children in discussion and critical thinking. In short, they have exemplified our holistic approach to learning, and it has been a joy to see.

The building (due to open in April 2025) has been designed for the children who will live there. Built over four levels, the lower two floors feature communal

spaces for socialising and study, a cinema screen and a large dining room, which will be used by day children and parents as well as boarders. A bespoke helter-skelter slide provides a sense of fun when travelling to the ground floor.

With state-of-the-art technology dividing corridors and floors for the boys and girls, the dormitories on the upper two floors will feature two-, three- and four-bed rooms, all ensuite. Pastoral routines will adapt to ensure hygiene and welfare are appropriately monitored, and the staff accommodation has been designed to support the children, day and night, as effectively as possible.

With solar panels on the roof and other energy-efficient features, we believe this sustainable building will not only be a benchmark for boarding design but also provide Biltonians with the time and space to develop academically, socially and emotionally. Most importantly, it will be a space for adventure, fun, down-time and togetherness which are the true values of any strong boarding community.



The Bilton Challenge

eptember 2023 saw the launch of a new initiative for children in the Upper School: The Bilton Grange Challenge. Although it is new, it emphasises something that BG has always known throughout its 150 years - that true character comes from those who recognise the need to help and serve others.

An 'education' at Bilton Grange is about far more than just the academic offering. The school believes in developing the whole person through exposing its pupils to as wide a range of experiences and opportunities as possible. For many years, possibly since Bilton Grange first became a school in 1873, it has presented the Bilton Cup to the individual child who has made the greatest allround commitment to school life. This is calculated through an elaborate points-scoring system which also enables a pupil average to be calculated so that the Section Bilton Cup can be awarded too.

The way in which the children conduct themselves is very important at Bilton Grange. This means adopting the correct attitudes and values for learning, alongside skills and knowledge. The dispositions of the Bilton Grange Learner Profile (BGLP) are at the heart of a strong learning attitude, and these are instilled from the earliest ages in Pre-Prep.

The BG Challenge combines personal development with a strong sense of community and aims to extend the philosophies of the BGLP and Bilton Cup, pull together various learning experiences and provide a mechanism through which pupils' development can be measured and their efforts recognised and rewarded. Crucially, there is no limit to the number of children who can achieve.

Pupils work towards a Bronze, Silver or Gold medal over their final two years, and we were delighted to make the first presentations at this year's Prize Giving. Twenty children received bronze medals, four silver and seven gold. I sincerely hope these will be cherished for years to come and serve as a reminder of the efforts that were made for those ground them.

As Albert Einstein once said, "Only a life lived in the service of others is worth living."

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At Bilton Grange, in the academic year 2023-2024, our primary teaching and learning focus was implementing Quality First Teaching and promoting active learning strategies in lessons.

Quality First Teaching refers to delivering high quality, engaging, and adaptive lessons, centering on activities that promote critical thinking, problem-solving, collaboration, and communication. These all dovetail perfectly with the Bilton Grange Learner Profile. In both the Pre-Prep and Prep, teachers have integrated active learning strategies such as group discussions, project-based learning, hands-on experiments, and interactive new technology tools into their lessons to enhance our pupils' educational experience. For example, pupils have devised rap songs to remember photosynthesis, reported on historical events by filming themselves as newsreaders and made vlogs about how their homes and the school building can be more sustainable, to name a few. It has been great to see the pupils use all aspects of our grounds as their classroom.

All these activities have made learning more enjoyable and enhanced children's problem-solving and critical-thinking skills. Most importantly, they have become more confident and motivated as they are given the opportunity to express their ideas and collaborate with their peers.

As we continue to prioritise Quality First Teaching and active learning, we are confident that our learners at Bilton Grange will be well-prepared for future challenges. Our educational approach equips them with the necessary skills to succeed in all aspects of their lives.



SOCIAL VALUES AND ENGAGEMENT WORK - BOARDING HOUSE BUILDING PROJECT

A real highlight of the year has been all the social values and engagement work we have been doing with Stepnell as part of the boarding house building project. Approximately 200 pupils, from The Nest to the 6th Form, have taken part in site visits, allowing them to see their new boarding house under construction and learn about the build process. Stepnell staff have presented assemblies and classes to the pupils, supported learning, given talks on architecture, sustainability and careers in construction, and have worked closely with the school staff to ensure Stepnell's time on site is of benefit and interest to the pupils.

For example, the 6th Form were fascinated by the arrival of the crane on site, and this became the focus of some fantastic descriptive writing about what the view of the school estate must look like from the crane cabin. Moreover, for World Book Day, the pupils used the mysterious discovery of an underground brick chamber to write a creative piece imagining what it could be, and Stepnell judged the entries. Overall, the engagement significantly contributed to the school being awarded the Muddy Stilettos award for the Most Creative Learning Through Play category in June; this national award was a testament to the School's achievement and the Stepnell teamwork and support.

September, we donated £746 to Jeans for Genes,
a charity supporting individuals with genetic
disorders. November saw a flurry of activity, with our
Home Clothes Day and 6th Form cake sale raising an
impressive £700 for Children in Need.

During the festive season, our Christmas jumper day was a hit, raising £165 for Save the Children. Students enthusiastically donned their Christmas jumpers for the Christmas lunch, contributing generously.

On Red Nose Day in March, we embraced the theme "Do something funny for money" by wearing odd socks and managed to raise £412 for charity.

The Big Catch was another highlight of our fundraising efforts. Pupils were sponsored to see how many consecutive catches they could make, and this exciting event raised £555 for the Motor Neurone Disease Association. Continuing our support for this cause, the Summer Fair's proceeds of £958 were also donated to the MNDA.

Beyond the work of the Charities Committee, the entire school community came together for several

other important causes. The McMillan Coffee Morning was a great success, raising £249 for the McMillan Charity, which supports people living with cancer. During the Pre-Prep and Prep Harvest Festival Services, we collected enough funds to donate £249 each to the Rugby Food Bank and the Hoskyn Centre, helping those in need in our local community.

The Remembrance Service in November raised £294 for the Royal British Legion, honouring those who have served in the armed forces. Additionally, the Christingle Service brought in £47 for the Children's Society, and the Christmas Service raised £638 for Myton Hospice, which provides compassionate end-of-life care.

This year has been a testament to our School's commitment to making a difference, showcasing the generosity and spirit of our pupils and parents. Together, we have raised substantial funds and made a meaningful impact on numerous lives.

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he Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange have completed their second year which has seen their singing and repertoire move from strength to strength. Since singing their inaugural service of choral Evensong in Rugby School

Chapel in September 2022, the choristers regularly sing six choral services each week during term time. Four services take place each week in Rugby School Chapel with the addition of professional lay clerk and student choral scholar

altos, tenors and basses. Two evensongs are in Bilton Grange Chapel with just treble voices.

There are currently 33 choristers: 18 boys and 15 girls. The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange regularly divides into four choirs: one of boys and one of girls, a combined boys' and girls' choir for senior choristers (Years 6, 7 and 8) and, very occasionally, all the choristers perform together. This enables the choristers to sing a very full schedule without being overly demanding on any of them in terms of time commitment.

A chorister parent writes:

"The chorister programme has been fantastic for our son. He has always enjoyed singing and had thought that he just enjoyed singing by himself. Since joining the Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange all that has changed. He has found other like-minded people who enjoy singing to the high standards that he aspires to reach, and he has never been happier. It has been transformational for him."

Although the main opportunity for the choristers to perform is singing choral Evensong, Advent and Epiphany carol services have already become popular annual occasions. Their first concert appearance was at a celebration for King Charles's Coronation in 2023, subsequently followed in May 2024 when the choristers teamed up with Rugby School Choral Society, dancers from Rugby School and Kings International Ballet Academy for a spectacular performance of Carmina Burana to a sold-out audience.

In November 2023, the choristers travelled to Oxford for a collaboration with the girls' choir of Merton College in which they sang choral Evensong under the direction of Dr Barry Rose OBE. Dr Rose was also the first composer to write a piece for the choristers, *Palms of Glory, raiment bright*. This composition featured in the first audio and video recordings by the choristers in April 2024.

In July 2024, the choristers performed with Canzona, one of England's leading ensembles specialising in the performance of baroque music on period instruments under the direction of Theresa Caudle, for a concert of music by Henry Purcell at The Festival on The Close. Conducted by Richard Tanner, the programme included a performance of Purcell's famous Te Deum. The concert also featured other well-known anthems by Purcell including Rejoice in the Lord Alway, My Beloved Spake, O Sing Unto The Lord and Thy Word is a Lantern.

At the end of a busy year, we said farewell to five founding choristers who joined the choir two years ago. Barney and Poppy continued to sing treble until the end of the year, whilst Arthur, Alexander and Alfie have been singing tenor in the 'back row' since their voices changed. We thank them all for their commitment to the choir and for their singing and musicianship. As we are going to press, we have heard that Barney is through to the semi-finals of the BBC Young Chorister of the Year; this is a fantastic achievement for Barney and the chorister programme.



ur 150th anniversary seemed an appropriate year to return Prize Giving to a marquee on the South Lawns and it was standing room only for some, such was the clamour to attend. In his speech, the Headmaster reflected upon the growing importance of statistics and data in the modern world and then proceeded to throw some quick-fire stats at the audience to represent the School through the year. Specifically, they do not always tell us about character which is the hallmark of a Bilton Grange education. Ultimately, in addressing the 6th Form and other leavers, he urged the children to continue being the characters they are, to develop their own personalities and to make their own decisions so that they definitely do not become just another statistic.

After the new Chair of Governors, Mr Nick Bacon, warmly thanked the pupils and staff for their efforts as well as the parents for their support, the Heads of School, as is tradition, gave their address on behalf of the pupils.

Head Boy, Jacobo Nunez Jado, went first and focused on his life as a boarder, sportsmanship, school trips and the bonds he has made. Left with a hatful of memories, his greatest takeaway will be the confidence he has developed from life as a boarder and for that, he said, he shall be forever grateful. Poppy Wilkes, Head Girl, followed and spoke about her academic development and involvement in the performing arts, areas in which she excelled because of the support she was given by her teachers. Her closing reflection was that, as well as being sad to leave, she is grateful for the platform BG has provided and she urged those remaining at the school to seize every opportunity that comes their way.

Finally, having presented the prizes, our guest for the day, Mr Rob Galbraith, OB (1997), said a few words. In a perfectly pitched address, Rob spoke with sincerity and humour about his experiences of joining the School as an Anglo-Japanese ten-year-old with an American accent, and how he had had to work out how to fit in and adjust to boarding life. His existence at BG became a very happy one and his fondness and passion for his BG days was clear for all to see and hear. He has many great friends with whom he remains in touch and the very fact that he travelled from Tokyo specifically to be here for Prize Giving said so much about how much the School means to him. It was an honour to have him back and, with his agreement to become an 'ambassador' for the Rugbeian Community in Japan, his links with the School will no doubt continue and strengthen.





SUPPORTING OUR SCHOOL COMMUNITY





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GIRLS' Sport Review

Girls' sport has continued to grow in strength this year. The addition of more coaches has enabled smaller coaching groups and greater opportunity for individual instruction, especially with the newer pupils.

Hockey

This year, our increased numbers allowed us to field five teams in the seniors, two U11 teams and two at U10. There were quite a few girls who were new to hockey, and this meant that there was a vast range of ability, skills and experience across the board. Nevertheless, the new girls picked up the skills quickly and, as the season progressed, the gap narrowed.

With the younger girls, we played a number of 'festival' style tournaments and triangulars, where everyone played for the fun of the game. With many of the little ones having not even picked up a hockey stick before this season, this seemed a wonderful way to introduce the experience of match days to them.

Throughout the season, we had a mixture of fixtures and results and, when we didn't have matches, we were often able to use Rugby Schools' facilities as well as our own so that all the girls could train outside. Having some excellent gap assistants, with a love of hockey, to assist JLJ and her team of coaches enabled consistent quality of coaching. Watching the different teams' progression was a pleasure to behold.

Netball

The girls had a fun term of netball where we saw a great many games played across the age groups. The U8s and U9s played a mixed bag of festival and tournament-style fixtures of 5-a-side and full, 7-a-side matches. For much of the season, these girls played friendly games where they enjoyed the experience of competitive games, without any winners or losers. The Middle School girls found themselves up against a lot of strong competition this year, especially the U11s. They never let their heads drop and managed to finish the season off with a couple of good, confidence boosting wins.

Some of the senior teams had a challenging time of it too as, to accommodate our opponents, the 2nd,

Tigers, Panthers and Jaguars often played teams ranked above them. The first team, who were a little below their best at the IAPS qualifying tournament, were runners-up in Warwickshire and, over the season, played 11 calendared games and were unbeaten; a feat last achieved in 2011!

Cricket

This year, we made more transition to hard ball for the majority of the senior and U11 girls. The 1st, 2nd, Tigers and U11A teams, resplendent in full protective gear, stuck to a pairs format. A fair number of our new and younger girls only started playing cricket this year, and some still found the harder ball a little intimidating, so we continued to play with an incrediball for the remaining teams. The junior girls and boys played mixed cricket in ability and gender. This resulted in some slightly mismatched games on occasions, but it enabled those with more experience to encourage their team mates, which made for much fun in training and matches. Although the inclement weather meant we missed nearly half of our planned fixtures, progress was made across the age groups, with the introduction of the new cricket nets making a big contribution to the improvement in our bowling. Most importantly, the girls are really developing a passion for the sport which bodes well for the future.

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BOYS' Sport Review

Rugby

The sports year began with BG fielding 12 boys' rugby teams: 80 competitive matches were played with an overall win ratio of 58.8%, with the U13A team displaying the highest win ratio at 85.7%. Captained by Hamish, highlights included winning the U13A tournament hosted at Bilton Grange against tough opposition. The team grew in strength through the season, winning 10 further matches and losing just one.

Each team from U13As to the U8 tag rugby team enjoyed a broad calendar of fixtures, the U11A winning 3 from 5 matches at the IAPS qualifying tournament. The U10A battled hard all season, producing two hard fought draws against Winchester House and Ratcliffe College and boasting a highly favourable win ratio through the two festivals attended.

Hockey

The inclusive nature of BG sports continued into the Lent Term, as we fielded 1st to 8th VIIs in the Upper School, and Colts A to G VIIs in the Middle School, as well as four U9 teams and four U8 teams competing in various fixtures. Every child at BG picked up their hockey stick to play.

Captain Jake led the 1st VII through 25 fixtures, producing an unbeaten season, outside of the IAPS tournament. Ranked 9th in the UK overall, having reached the National Finals, is an exceptional record!

The Colts A played 15 fixtures, winning 9 and drawing 3. The future looks bright for these boys. Other highlights of the season included hosting the U11 In2 Hockey County tournament and progressing to the Midlands Finals.

The U9 and U8 teams really got to use their hockey skills in their seven fixtures, five of which were multi-match festivals. BG hockey has made great strides forward in recent years, and this year was no exception.

Cricket

The boys and mixed gender cricket teams played 116 competitive fixtures. The BG ground staff are to be commended for the great work performed on the 11 grass wickets at BG, especially early in the season with the poor weather persisting.
