RUGBY SCHOOL

Rugby School Chapels

The building was designed by the gothic revival Architect, William Butterfield in 1875 and the interior remains as it was constructed. The smaller Memorial Chapel which is linked to the main chapel was built as a memorial to those who lost their lives from the Rugby School community in the First World War. It was designed by Sir Charles Nicholson of School House (brother of Sir Sydney Nicholson, also School House, composer and sometime organist of Westminster Abbey, founder of the Royal School of Church Music) and consecrated in 1922.

The main Rugby School Chapel contains an organ by the firm Kenneth Jones and Associates of Bray, Ireland which was built in 2001 with additions and improvements by Nicholson Organ Builders of Worcester. It is a four manual instrument comprising fifty-four stops. The organ has recently been renovated with tonal improvements by Nicholsons.

The Memorial Chapel contains an organ by Harrison and Harrison of Durham built in 1923. It is a two manual instrument of six stops.

Bilton Grange School Chapel

The mansion which forms the main school was built in 1846 attached to an existing farmhouse and was a private family home. It was designed by the eminent designer and architect Augustus Welby Pugin for Captain Washington Hibbert and is a Grade II* listed building. The first pupils were brought to the house by The Reverend Walter Earle in 1887. The brewhouse was converted into the school chapel in 1889 and classrooms were added in 1892.

The chapel contains an historic organ built by the London firm of Gray and Davison in 1892. The organ is a three manual instrument of nineteen stops and has been given an Historic Organ Certificate and listed as Grade II. It is in need of a major restoration!

Access to the Chapels for Services

Parents and visitors to services in Rugby School Chapel should enter the school via the Queen's Gate on Barby Road and the Chapel via the doors on the north and south sides. Disabled parking only is available on 'The Porridge' close to the Chapel. Parents may park in Michell House car park in Little Church Street after 5.30pm and will be given the gate code.

Parents and visitors to services in Bilton Grange Chapel should enter the school via the School Reception at the North Entrance.

Evensong

The service of Evensong has been used in English churches for centuries and is unchanged for more than 300 years. It is designed to be a daily reminder and celebration of the Incarnation – the Christian belief that Almighty God became a human being to share our life and lead us back to the life of heaven with him. The service begins with sung responses and a selection from the psalms – ancient hymns of praise, petition, questioning and triumph. At the heart of the service are the two ‘canticles’: Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis. In the Magnificat, the choir sing the joyful words first uttered by a young girl, Mary, when she heard she was to be the mother of Jesus. The Nunc Dimittis is the song of an old man, Simeon, who had been promised that he would not die until he had seen God’s chosen King with his own eyes. When they placed the baby Jesus in his arms, that ancient servant of the Lord knew that he could depart in peace.

The service includes two readings from God’s word to us in the Bible, a declaration of our faith in the spoken words of the creed, and prayers for the world and for ourselves.

Over the centuries many of the world’s greatest musicians have composed pieces known as ‘settings’ for use at Evensong. Every day the same, but every day different, Choral Evensong is truly one of the Church’s treasures.

Rugby School Services

The whole school meets in chapel for morning prayers on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. On Sundays there is a more formal service with music sung by the Arnold Singers – a choir of pupils and staff. This service is followed by a short service of Holy Communion in the Memorial Chapel. Parents and visitors are welcome to join us for these Sunday services and for refreshments in School House afterwards.

The Arnold Singers sing the ancient monastic service of Compline on two evenings this term.

The Temple Consort will also sing several Evensongs this term including a live broadcast on BBC Radio 3 on Wednesday 5 February with the Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange, which you can hear on BBC Sounds until 5 March.

The Readings for Choral Evensong in the Lent Term

In the Advent Term we heard stories of important figures of the Old Testament, from Abraham and Sarah through to the Prophets of Israel who foretold the coming of a future King, the Messiah. This prepared us for a joyful time at the end of the Advent term as in our carol services we looked forward to the birth of Jesus in the stable at Bethlehem.

This term begins with the celebration of the season of Epiphany, the season of light. Our readings take up the story of the child born in the stable and we think about the light of the Christ child, revealed to the Wise men who travelled from afar to Bethlehem. We hear the story of John the Baptist recognising Jesus as the light coming into the world and the story of the baptism of Jesus by John.

Jesus calls disciples to follow him and challenges them to let their light shine in the world.

After half term we move towards the keeping of Lent and through Lent we think about what Jesus expects of those who follow him.

As in the Advent term we shall again celebrate with the church around the world some special Feast Days: the Baptism of Jesus; the week of Prayer for Christian Unity when we pray that all Christians might be one; the Conversion of St Paul on the Road to Damascus; the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem; and keep a special Evensong in celebration of International Women's Day.

The Psalms at Evensong

One of the joys of Evensong is the singing of the psalms. These are a collection of 150 texts in the Old Testament which were attributed to King David but are now thought to be by various authors from the 9th to 5th Centuries BC. The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange aspire to singing the psalms appointed for each day in the Book of Common Prayer. During the learning process we have selected portions of psalms which we have appointed for each day across a four week cycle. The texts of these psalms are printed towards the end of this Service Booklet. All the psalms conclude with the Gloria:

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Ghost; as it was in the beginning is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen

Week 2 – Epiphany 1

- Old Testament: Isaiah 60. 1-3 and 6 *Isaiah foretells the coming of kings and nations to the Light*
- New Testament: Matthew 2. 1-13 *The Wise Men come to the stable bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh*

Tuesday 14 January

- Old Testament: Isaiah 9. 2, 6 and 7 *Isaiah foretells the one called to be a light to the nations who will establish peace and justice*
- New Testament: John 1. 29 – 34 *John the Baptist recognises the man Jesus as the Son of God*

Thursday 16 January, The Epiphany Carol Service

Week 3 – Epiphany 2

We take this week to celebrate with Christians around the world the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity by reflecting on Jesus' prayer for the unity of his disciples then and our unity now.

Monday 20 January - Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

- Old Testament: Galatians 3. 26-28 *St Paul tells the Galatians that all who are baptised are one in Christ*
- New Testament: John 17. 6-11 *Jesus on the night before his death prays for the unity of his disciples who had followed him during his earthly ministry*

Tuesday 21 January - Week of Prayer for Christian Unity – 18-25th

- Old Testament: Acts 2. 44 -47 *A picture of the first Christians living together in unity*
- New Testament: John 17. 20 -23 *The unity of Christians today is to be a sign to the world of what is possible for all people*

Thursday 23 January

- Old Testament: Hosea 11: 1 – 4 *The prophet Hosea speaks of God's love for his people and his care for them*
- New Testament: John 17: 24 – end *Jesus prays that his disciples will be joined in love, the love that he shares with his Father*

Week 4 – Epiphany 3

Monday 27 January – Conversion of St Paul (transferred)

- Old Testament: Jeremiah 1. 4-10 *The calling of the prophet Jeremiah, an example of God's calling of each person to their individual vocation*
- New Testament: Galatians 1. 11- 16a *St Paul describes to the disciples at Galatia his own conversion on the Road to Damascus*

Tuesday 28 January – No Evensong

Thursday 30 January

- 1 Kings 17: 8-16 *Elijah the prophet provides food for the starving widow and her son*
- John 2: 1-11 *Jesus reveals who he is in his first miracle at the wedding feast in Cana of Galilee where he turns water into wine*

Friday 31 January

- Old Testament: Isaiah 49. 5 and 6 *Isaiah prophesies that the Servant of the Lord will be a light to the nations, that God's salvation may reach to the end of the world*
- New Testament: John 1. 6-13 *As we come to the end of the season of Epiphany we return to the opening chapter of the Gospel of John where John points to Jesus as the true light that enlightens everyone coming into the world*

Week 5 – Presentation of Christ in the Temple

Monday 3 February – The Presentation of Christ in the Temple

- Old Testament: Malachi 3. 1-5 *The prophet foretells the coming of God to the Temple*
- New Testament: Luke 2. 22 – 35 and 40 *We look back to the presentation of Christ as a baby in the Temple and hear Simeon blessing God for the child, Jesus who is to be 'a light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of God's people Israel'.*

Tuesday 4 February

- Old Testament: Isaiah 11: 1-3 *The prophet Isaiah speaks of the one who is the future hope of Israel who has the spirit of wisdom and understanding.*
- New Testament: Luke 2: 41-52 *The 12 year old Jesus is found by his parents in the temple in Jerusalem listening and questioning the teachers and growing in wisdom and favour with God.*

Thursday 6 February – No Evensong

Friday 7 February

- Old Testament: Isaiah 49: 5 and 6 *As we approach the end of the season of Epiphany we remember that Isaiah had foretold the coming of the Servant who would be a light to the nations.*

- Old Testament: Jeremiah 17 – 5-10 *The prophet Jeremiah tells the people that those who trust in the Lord are blessed.*
- New Testament: Matthew 5: 1 – 12 *Jesus begins his Sermon on the Mount by describing to his disciples those who are blessed.*

Friday 21 March – Final Evensong of Term

- Old Testament: Deuteronomy 26: 16 -end *What it means to be a people holy to the Lord.*
- New Testament: Matthew 5: 43 -end *Jesus commends the way of loving enemies and praying for those who persecute you.*

The Organ Voluntaries

This term a number of Rugby School organ students are playing parts of the service of Evensong in Rugby School Chapel and still more will play voluntaries at Evensong. Our Organ Scholar regularly plays for Evensong in Bilton Grange Chapel on Mondays and for Evensong in Rugby School Chapel on Tuesdays.

In the season of Epiphany, we hear the effervescent *moto perpetuo* of *Dubois Fiat Lux* (Let there be light) and the *Leighton Toccata* on 'Hanover', a tune often sung to 'O Worship the King'. At the Epiphany Carol Service *Messiaen's* Les Mages from *La Nativité*, shows the long journey that the 'Kings' made with the gentle trudging of camels against a shimmering harmony of the star; the service concludes in a blaze of colour with the end of *Messiaen's* *La Nativité* suite, *Dieu parmi nous* (God among us); the end of this piece is truly awe inspiring!

For the transfer of the Conversion of St Paul on 27 January the service will end with a virtuosic arrangement of the Overture to *Mendelssohn's* oratorio 'St Paul' by *W T Best*. Best was municipal organist at St George's Hall, Liverpool for forty years and clearly had a prodigious pedal technique!

At the conclusion of the BBC Radio 3 broadcast on Wednesday 5 February our organ scholar will play Final Op.7 No. 5 by *Dupré*. This opens with a bold and assertive theme that is developed through a series of virtuosic passages culminating in a triumphant conclusion.

The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange

The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange consists of a choir of girl choristers and a choir of boy choristers who sing separately alongside adult, professional singers and choral scholars in the Chapel at Rugby School as well as singing by themselves in Bilton Grange School Chapel.

Children are able to join the programme in Years 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 remaining until the age of 13 (the end of Year 8).

All choristers attend Bilton Grange Preparatory School, where they receive a discounted education either as day or boarding pupils. Further means tested support can be provided. Choristers receive free tuition on two musical instruments in addition to their singing.

Lay Clerks and Choral Scholars

Evensong at Rugby School is sung by the Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange together with the Lay Clerks and Choral Scholars of Rugby School. Lay Clerks are members of staff or freelance professional singers, whilst the Choral Scholars are students of Rugby School who may be music scholars and working towards a Choral Scholarship at university.
